Matfen Book Club meets regularly in the hall; here's convenor Jenny Osborne's account of the last meeting:

Matfen Book Club met last week to review their third book, which was chosen by Jill Lloyd. 'Trespases' by Louise Kennedy was a big change in genre from the previous two reads. It is a number 1 bestseller (*The Times*), and winner of various prestigious awards. Classed as historical/political fiction, it is set in Northern Ireland during the troubles of the 1970s and tells the story of a love affair between a young Catholic woman and an older married Protestant man.

The book was enjoyed and positively reviewed by the majority of the group, though there were questions raised regarding how the troubles were presented by the author. Nevertheless, we valued gaining an insight into how difficult life was for those living with sectarianism and the ongoing relentless threat of violence and murder which prevailed in Belfast at this time. The characters in the book were interesting, with the romance between the main characters portrayed with a gritty realism which we all knew was likely to be doomed. Overall the book was, perhaps, compelling rather than enjoyable.



The club will be meeting again on **February 20th at 7pm** and we will be reviewing **'Mrs Bridge' by Evan S. Connell**. If you can't make this but are fancying joining in, the next meeting after that is **3rd April** when we will be reviewing **'The Little Coffee Shop of Kabul'** by Deborah Rodriguez. An exciting development at GO Local Food:



Up till now, crop share members have had to collect their vegetables from the growing fields in Ovington. In an exciting development for 2025, from the beginning of April, they will have the option of collecting their fresh, seasonal vegetables from a brand-new collection point in Hexham. Bringing veg closer to crop share members is about convenience, and also about aligning with GO Local Food's shared environmental goals. Reducing the distance travelled helps us all lower our carbon footprint. This move also addresses a recurring challenge, which is that potential members are sometimes eager to join but unable to reach Ovington easily. With Hexham as a new hub, the door is open to new members in the community.

And this is just the beginning! If all goes well, GO Local Food hopes to expand further, bringing collection points even closer to more members. Could Matfen be next? GO Local Food have wanted to start growing in Matfen for a while, and this may be the time.

Winter in the Community garden – notes from Liz Bishop:

The New Year has begun with a range of weather: rain, snow, fog and warmth with some welcome sunshine. Through all this, only those plants which cope will be on show for our enjoyment through the year.

At the base of the roadside wall, where soil is warmed by the sun, daffodil leaves are already showing. Inside the garden in the shade below the wall and hedge, three foxglove rosettes show frost but will be producing spires of flower in summer.




Where sunshine passes through the chestnut branches, bunches of grass will become more colourful – yellow, bronze, green and white – in warmer conditions.

Along the gravel boundary, grape hyacinths have their leaf spikes above ground. A sedum holding its winter form carries frost on its old flower heads. Freddie and his Mum planted this sedum as a smaller piece 3 years ago.

Snowdrops will be showing soon. Donated geraniums giving different flower colours have all made good growth. Other plants are still hiding under leafy blankets. Seed sowing time approaches.

Your spare plants are always welcome; thank you. There is much to anticipate in the garden year ahead.



January Freeze in the Bird World – Alan Todd:

The Tawny Owl, perched roadside near Matfen Hotel at dusk on 2nd January, appeared to watch the weather with fearful apprehension. Temperatures fell, as did my bird tally. A few snow covered gardens held Tree Sparrows, Bullfinches, Great Spotted Woodpecker (heard ‘drumming’ on frozen mornings) and Starlings huddled in night time roosts. ‘Cold snaps’ may bring Scandinavian Brambling; brown and orange upper-parts, thin white rump and ‘buzzsaw’ call, help separate them from similar Chaffinches.

Ponds near Great Whittington and around Matfen Golf Course froze over. On the 16th, Mallard, Teal and Moorhen returned to a thawing Whittington Bog. The Golf Course was re-occupied by over 100 Canada and 2 Greylag Geese, Mute Swans, Mallard and Moorhen, plus a single Little Egret, notably joined by another 5 days later!

This year’s RSPB ‘Big Garden Birdwatch’ was on 24-26 Jan – did you take part? If you did – and enjoyed it – consider an alternative Citizen Science project that runs all year: British Trust for Ornithology (BTO) ‘Garden Birdwatch’ (www.bto.org/our-science/projects/gbw). I enrolled during COVID lockdown, and continue to this day!

Olga Samusieva offers some interesting thoughts on the coming year:



I'm not a prophet, but I can confidently say that we are heading for deep and powerful transformations. The old ways – beliefs, thoughts, and habits – will start to fade away. If they don't change, a large part of humanity will suffer.

History Corner

Sally Urwin is busy with other matters this month, but she will definitely be back in future newsletters. So I thought it would be interesting to include a few facts about All Saints' Church, Ryal, the little church on the hill just a couple of miles from Matfen. All Saints' is a chapel of ease, which are small chapels built within the bounds of the parish for those who can't conveniently reach the parish church (at the time, St Mary's Stamfordham). The Ordnance Survey Object Name Books of the 1860s reports that All Saints was,

An old chapel belonging to the Church of England. It is partially ruinous and is not and never will be used as a Chapel again, a new one having been erected recently [1842] in the village of Matfen.

Despite this, All Saints' Church, Ryal, thought to date from the 12th century, was restored in 1879 and still serves as a place of worship for the community. There's more to say about this beautiful church – look out for more information in future newsletters.
